Dear Superintendent Rivas:

We write to you as an international community gravely concerned about Essal's violations of the human right to water in Osorno, and its parent corporation, Suez's, attempts to evade accountability and justice. Recent news indicates Suez/Aguas Andinas is attempting to wash its hands of the crisis in Osorno by selling its majority stake in Essal.<sup>1</sup> Regardless of the corporation's shareholding, the people of Osorno have made clear their demands for the concession to be terminated and for Essal and its affiliated corporations to be held accountable. We echo the demands of civil society in Osorno, and urge you to conclude the accountability process quickly and transparently—and deliver justice for the people of Osorno.

As you well know, the incident that took place in July of 2019, which left 97.9 percent of the population of Osorno without water for over 10 days,<sup>2</sup> represents a grave violation of the human right to water. In January of this year, over 90 percent of voters voted to end the Essal contract in a citizen's referendum.<sup>3</sup> Due to Essal's flagrant abuses, and out of respect for the democratic expression of the will of the people, it is clear that you must finish the evaluation and subsequent recommendation to the national government to end the contract.

Suez's threat to take Chile to international arbitration<sup>4</sup> is an outrageous intimidation tactic and must not be tolerated. The contract termination process was triggered by Essal's own negligence and failure to deliver a clean water supply to residents for a prolonged period—impacting the health and well-being of thousands of residents.<sup>5</sup> This move, frequently used by Suez and other transnational corporations,<sup>6</sup> is a

blatant attempt to subvert accountability—and to take advantage of the public’s limited ability to participate in democratic processes during a pandemic. The international community supports you in standing up to this intimidation by Suez.

Therefore, we echo the following demands of local Osorno civil society:

1. Do not succumb to pressure from transnational corporations like Suez by abandoning the contract termination process.
2. Ensure that the contract termination process is expedient and transparent.

We urge you to take all steps necessary to hold Essal and its affiliated corporations accountable for the abuses in Osorno. People’s lives depend on it.
