RESOURCING ORGANIZATIONS CHALLENGING CORPORATE ABUSE

Corporate Accountability's Movement Solidarity Fund (the "fund") moves financial resources to campaign organizations and liberatory social movements dismantling corporate power, reclaiming peoples' sovereignty, and building a world rooted in cooperation, care, and sacredness of all life. Through the fund, we aim to establish equitable and mutual flows of resources and wisdom-sharing that strengthen us all.

LEADING WITH ABUNDANCE

Since our inception, we have campaigned in solidarity with organizations and peoples in the Global South and the U.S. who are directly impacted by corporate abuse. Early on, we started making small grants to these organizations and leaders in order to advance our shared campaign objectives—from sponsoring allies to attend international negotiations to organizing global solidarity actions. The fund represents both an expansion and formalization of this practice.

As corporate campaign organizers, we believe the fund is a vital strategy to not only win our campaigns,

but also build movements globally to create transformational change. To this end, we envision the fund as fulfilling **the following objectives:**

- 1. Building people-power:** As a movement, we cannot realistically stop abusive and extractive practices by transnational corporations if our partners are not well resourced, including both our campaign partners and allies across different social movements engaged in challenging corporate abuse.
- 2. Creating a channel of accountability to grassroots/front-line struggles:** Corporate Accountability's active and ongoing redistribution of resources from the Global North to our collaborators on the front line is one critical way for us to remain accountable to their needs and vision, and be in right relationship with partners.
- 3. Fostering mutual benefit, trust, and support:** We benefit from grantmaking manifolds such as gaining wisdom, experience, legitimacy, and recognition. Our grantmaking pushes and challenges us to deepen our analysis of corporate power, abuse, and impunity, ultimately strengthening our campaigns' strategies, tactics, and demands.

FROM SCARCITY TO ABUNDANCE: BUILDING A NEW PHILANTHROPY MODEL

In a global economic system that is increasingly exploitative and dramatically unequal, traditional philanthropy plays a complicit role in maintaining the concentration of wealth in the hands of a few individuals and organizations. The philanthropy economy is a direct outgrowth of extractive and exploitative economic systems that have resulted in dramatic wealth inequalities.

In this respect, traditional philanthropy is inextricably linked to systems of oppression, primarily capitalism, which sees the world as being defined by the values of scarcity and competition. This dynamic perpetuates a culture of scarcity and competition among social movements and campaign organizations and undermine progress and collaboration.

Our approach is to redistribute funds with an abundance mindset, which says: resources are plentiful and shared distribution is an essential tactical counterweight.

CATALYZING THE MOVEMENT TO CHALLENGE CORPORATE POWER ACROSS AFRICA

With seed funding from the Movement Solidarity Fund, Corporate Accountability and Public Participation Africa (CAPPA) was born out of a legacy of challenging authoritarianism and corporate power, including campaigning with Corporate Accountability to stop water privatization. This powerhouse front-line campaign organization based in Lagos, Nigeria is advancing human rights and challenging corporate abuse across the African continent and beyond.

CAPPA's victories include: preventing water privatization in Lagos, uplifting the demands of communities impacted by the climate crisis to government decision-makers, and building a network of organizers challenging corporations for profiting from Africa's natural resources. Our ongoing grantmaking, powered by members and funders across the U.S., helps to make this impact possible.
